Each summer members and friends of Skagit Audubon gather in this U.S. Forest Service Campground (USFS) off Highway 20, 1.2 miles up a side road on the north side of the highway near Highway mile 175, at elevation 2,900 ft. There are usually plenty of sharp eyes in our group and the birding is great right on the campground loops as well as on nearby trails and birding areas further down in the Methow Valley. Puget Sound Energy's Avian Protection Program

All around the Skagit and Samish flats we can see the work of Puget Sound Energy's Avian Protection Program. Collisions between swans and power lines can be fatal. Raptors landing on power poles may suffer injury or death. This program describes how Puget Sound Energy (PSE) addresses these problems.

PSE has been managing avian issues since at least 1979 when the company moved its first osprey nest from a utility pole. Since then, the program has grown to include an Avian Protection Plan, avian-safe construction standards, reporting and response systems, and many mitigation projects. PSE works closely with federal and state wildlife agencies. (For more information see: www.pse.com/aboutpse/Environment/Pages/Bird-Protection.aspx)

Haley Edwards is a Natural Resource Scientist for Puget Sound Energy. She assists with the Avian Protection Program and manages projects under the Baker Hydroelectric Project license relating to birds and their habitat. Prior to coming to PSE she worked in Michigan and Washington state on habitat restoration and avian survey projects, including spotted owls, marbled murrelets, and others.

PRESIDENT'S JUNE MESSAGE:

Perusing government reports may not be your favorite leisure time activity, but here's a good one to scan, and not just on a rainy day: the 2011 State of the Birds Report (www.stateofthebirds.org). The report comes out yearly, organized by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service with the involvement of the other federal land managing agencies, some of their state equivalents, and a good list of non-governmental groups such as our very own National Audubon Society. Last year's report focused on global warming in relation to birds. This year it's about how public lands (federal, state, local) support bird populations and to what degree they do so. In trust for us, public agencies manage about a third of all land in the U.S., though law and policy focus only some of that management on conservation. In the State of the Birds Report you will learn, for example, that "these publicly owned habitats support at least half of the entire U.S. distributions of more than 300 bird species." To give just one example, almost all the Trumpeter Swans wintering in the lower-48 breed in Alaska on public land, especially areas managed by the Bureau of Land Management.

It's heartening that public lands are as important as they are to many bird species because we have a say in the management of this land, if we care to exercise it. This is one of the things Audubon does, both nationally and at the state and chapter level: we advocate with public agencies for birds and

other wildlife and their habitat. One thing this report can do for us is suggest areas on which we, as well as the land managing agencies, would do well to focus more attention.

The report ends with a description of the databases which generated the many percentages and statistics throughout the 48 pages (there are nice bird photographs too). Of particular interest is the central importance of eBird data in providing information about bird distributions. Ebird is the grand citizen science project of Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology that allows (and urges) each of us to contribute our bird sightings on-line (www.eBird.org). If you submitted sightings to eBird, you helped create this picture of bird distribution across the U.S. Read that section of the report's page 45 to get fired up about how your birding can contribute. And read the list on page 29 to see ways you can influence how public lands support birds, such as buying the annual federal duck stamp. Since that program began in 1934, stamp revenues have purchased over 5 million acres of waterfowl habitat. What the list cannot do, because this is a government publication, is urge you to tell your legislators how you would like land managing agencies to be funded and staffed. Public ownership of land has clearly been essential to the preservation of many bird species and will continue to be so. Read the State of the Birds Report and you will appreciate more than ever what a rich legacy we have in our public lands – and the birds that depend on them.

If a hike destination is changed, the meeting time and meeting place will remain the same.

- Northwest Forest Pass (parking permit) required.
- All the hikes are on Wednesdays.
- Adopt-A-Tail work parties with Dan Rogers are on Mondays. Wear old clothes and have gloves, fluids to drink, and lunch. Tools provided.
- Dogs are discouraged on Audubon-sponsored hikes. If dogs are on a hike, they must be on a leash at <u>all</u> times.

JUNE 1, WEDNESDAY ~ SAN JUAN ISLAND

Hike on trails at American Camp, Whale Watch Park/Limekiln State Park, and English Camp. Meet at 8:15 a.m. at March Point Park-n-Ride to pool rides. No ferry walkons as we will need cars on the island. We will take the 9:30 a.m. ferry from Anacortes, arriving in Friday Harbor at 10:35 a.m. Return ferry sailings are 4:15 p.m. and 6:25 p.m. Carpool

according to return times. People staying on the island for dinner will take the 6:25 p.m. sailing back.

JUNE 4, SATURDAY ~ NATIONAL TRAILS DAY

Celebrate trails! Go for a hike or walk with family and/or friends. The Pacific Northwest Trail Association will sponsor trail work at Deception Pass State Park. Contact Joan Melcher (360-424-0407 or at jdmelcher@comcast.net) for details if interested.

JUNE 6, MONDAY ~ ADOPT-A-TRAIL WORK PARTY (If Hwy 20 is open)

Trail work with Dan Rogers (Ed Rogers son) in the Okanogan National Forest. Wear old clothes, have gloves, a lunch, and fluids to drink. Meet at 7:00 a.m. in the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion parking lot. Work site will be the annual maintenance on the Ruby Creek and Canyon Creek Trails.

JUNE 8, WEDNESDAY ~ ROSS LAKE, WEST SHORE

Hike down to Ross Dam and beyond along the west Shore Ross Lake as far as the Big Beaver if you wish. There are many other turn-around points. It is up to 13 miles round trip and up to 1,800 ft. total elevation gain. There are two return times: 4:30 p.m. for those who wish to hike to Pierce Creek or Big Beaver and 3:00 p.m. for those who turn around before. Carpooling will depend upon what return time you

select. Meet at 7:30 a.m. on the east side of the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion parking lot.

JUNE 15, WEDNESDAY ~ BAKER RIVER

Hike along the Baker River to Sulfide Creek, entering the North Cascades National Park along the way. Dogs are not permitted on the National Park section of the trail. It is 5 miles round trip, 300 ft. elevation gain. Meet at 8:30 a.m. on the east side of the Sedro-Woollev Food Pavilion

parking lot. A Northwest Forest Pass (parking permit) is required. There is a 1:30 p.m. return to the trailhead, if you do just the river hike; 2:00 p.m. return if you also walk south to Hidden Creek on the north Baker Lake Trail.

JUNE 22 WEDNESDAY ~ OLD SAUK RIVER TRAIL

The Old Sauk River Trail is a hike along the scenic Sauk River. On this low-elevation trail you will walk through patches of old growth Douglas firs. It is 6 miles round trip, with little elevation gain. When all the people in your car have returned to the trailhead, you may leave. Meet at 8:30 a.m. in the parking lot of the Mount Vernon Safeway.

JUNE 29 WEDNESDAY BAKER LAKE TRAIL FROM THE NORTH

Hike over the Baker River Bridge, the Blum Creek Bridge, and along the northern section of the Baker Lake Trail to Noisy Creek and back. It is 9.2 miles round trip, with a slight elevation gain. Meet at 8 a.m. on the east side of the parking lot at the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion. A Northwest Forest parking permit is required. Return to the trailhead at 3 p.m.

JULY 6, WEDNESDAY ~ HEATHER LAKE

Hike to and around a scenic lake at an elevation of 2,400 ft. off the Mountain Loop Highway near Mt. Pilchuck. It is a 4.8 miles round trip; with a 1,000 ft. elevation gain. Meet at 8 a.m. in the Mount Vernon Safeway parking lot.

Seattle/Snohomish County/Camano Island hikers can go directly to the trailhead. Return to the trailhead for faster hikers at 1 p.m.; return for slower hikers at 2:30 p.m. Carpool accordingly.

JULY 11, MONDAY ~ ADOPT-A-TRAIL WORK PARTY

Trail work with Dan Rogers in the Okanogan National Forest. There will be bridge work on the Rainy Lake Trail. Wear old clothes, have gloves, a lunch, and fluids to drink. Meet at 7:00 a.m. in the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion parking lot.

JULY 13, WEDNESDAY ~ WILDERNESS HIKE

This hike is 4.2 miles round trip, with a 1,200 ft. elevation gain with an option to walk down to Sauk Lake, It is 7.2 miles round trip, 2,400 ft. elevation gain. Meet at 7:30 a.m. in the parking lot of the Sedro-Woolley Food Pavilion. Return to the trailhead for those who go to summit only at 12:30 p.m.; return for those who do both summit and Sauk Lake at 2:30 p.m. Carpool accordingly. Add hikes in Rockport State Park after the Sauk Mountain hike if you wish.

night dinner potluck. Informal groups form to look for birds, or folks go out on their own with binoculars or cameras. Klipchuck is a magnet for warblers and vireos, flycatchers and woodpeckers, hummingbirds and wildflowers. A trail to Driveway Butte leads up the hill right out of the campground for the ambitious hiker. Deer are usually fawning around the campground so dogs are not recommended and must be kept on leashes. It's about 6 miles to Mazama, the nearest store, so come with what you need or plan to drive a bit further to resupply.

Overnight campground fee is \$12 per site. Vault toilets and water are available. If you plan to hike from a trailhead be sure and bring your USFS parking permit, available from USFS offices in Sedro Woolley and Winthrop.

Thursday, June 23 Big Four Area 6:30 a.m. to Early Afternoon

The Big Four area lies along the south fork of the Stillaguamish River east of Granite Falls. The birding is exceptional in June and the picnic area has spectacular views of Big Four Mountain and Hall Peak. Another bonus is the diversity of alpine wildflowers along the trail. The 1 mile trail takes you on a boardwalk across a fresh water marsh (expect to see Red-breasted Sapsuckers, Flycatchers, Warblers), across a bridge over the south fork of the Stillaguamish River (look for Dippers, Common Mergansers, Harlequin Ducks and Spotted Sandpipers), into the forest (Pacific Wrens, Brown Creepers, Western Wood-pewees and Varied Thrushes are common) and eventually to a huge cirque that ends at a lookout area (we'll plan to eat lunch here). Wear hiking boots and expect to walk a leisurely 2 miles round trip, 200' elevation gain. Bring lunch and USFS parking permit. Meet at Big 4 Meadows at 8 a.m. or 6:30 a.m. at the Exit 212 Park & Ride for carpools. Leader: Pam Pritzl 360-387-7024.




