## **Padilla Bay Christmas Bird Count 2023**

The 2023 Padilla Bay Christmas Bird Count (CBC) organized by Skagit Audubon will take place Saturday, December 30<sup>th</sup>.

The fifteen-mile diameter count circle is one of nearly 2,500 where volunteers will document the species and numbers of birds present late this year. Because the CBC is such a long-running project its data make an important contribution to avian science. Rather than a birding field trip, the CBC is an effort to collect the most complete and accurate data possible on the birds within the count circle. We particularly need the

## Saturday, Nov. 11, 2023 - Clayton Beach Trail, Larabee State Park - 8:30 am-Noon (approx.) Trip Leader: Tim Manns (360.333.8985)

The recently completed new trail to Clayton Beach provides for safe crossing over the BNSF tracks. The trail traverses mixed forest for 0.6 miles to reach this 0.25-mile-long beach on Samish Bay. We should hear and/or see typical forest species and, from the beach, a good variety of wintering sea birds and ducks. The trail has 3 sets of stairs and is mostly gravel from the parking lot to the railroad crossing with a few steep bits. From the tracks to the beach the trail has only been roughed out but is readily passable. Round trip if the tide permits walking the full length of the beach: 1.7 miles.

Directions: Follow Chuckanut Drive (SR 11) to the Lost Lake Parking Lot in Larrabee State Park (*Discover Pass required*). The lot is just off the road on the east side of Chuckanut Drive. Bring binoculars and scope if you have one. Dress for the weather and potential wind at the beach. Wear shoes or boots suitable for hiking. #### Sunday, Nov. 26, 2023 – Barnum Point (Camano Island) – 9 am until 12 noon

Trip Leaders: Colleen Shannon (<u>fieldtrips@skagitaudubon.org</u>) and Pam Pritzl

Meet at the parking area of Barnum Point Park at 9 am. There is limited parking there so carpool if you can. We will limit the trip to 12 people due to the parking. Be ready to see any number of seabirds who have returned to the Salish Sea for the winter. We have been known to see up to 600 Barrow's Goldeneyes there. We will hike about a half mile through fir forests to arrive at Triangle Cove, so we will also be able to hear and view forest species. If you haven't been to Barnum Point you are in for a real treat. There are a variety of habitats in the park. It is not an accessible area. Dress for the weather, including windy conditions or rain. ## **CONSERVATION** — by Tim Manns

<u>Audubon Advocacy Days</u>: Skagit Audubon cannot endorse political candidates but does advocate for legislation related to its wildlife protection mission. This year Audubon Washington is once again organizing Advocacy Days (December 4 – 8) to facilitate urging our state legislators to support priority conservation bills. There will be information forthcoming about priorities around climate resilience, restoring and protecting habitat, and more. Audubon Washington will provide on-line training for the brief, virtual (Zoom) meetings we will have with elected representatives for our home districts. Our representatives want to hear from us before and during the state legislative session which begins January 8<sup>th</sup>.

Restoring the North Cascades Grizzly Bear: November 13<sup>th</sup> is the deadline for written comments to the National Park Service and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service on the plan to restore this missing species to the North Cascades. Read the plan and comment at ParkPlanning - Draft Grizzly Bear Restoration Plan / Environmental Impact Statement, North Cascades Ecosystem (nps.gov). Trapping and hunting wiped out grizzlies, which had been common for thousands of years in the North Cascades. In 1991 the North Cascades Ecosystem was designated one of six recovery zones for this animal listed as Threatened under the Endangered Species Act in 1975. The on again, off again process of restoring this keystone species is finally inching forward again. Skagit Audubon is a member of the Friends of the North Cascades Grizzly Bear coalition, whose website offers more background (https://www.northcascadesgrizzly.org/).

Skagit County Shoreline Master Program (SMP): The Washington Department of Ecology (DOE) is reviewing Skagit County's first comprehensive update since 1976 of this required plan for managing shoreline development and protection. Counties are not yet required to address sea level rise in their SMPs, but it would seem commonsensical to do so in one of the counties most vulnerable to this consequence of climate change. In the last few years, a coalition of groups including Audubon Washington and Skagit Audubon have repeatedly made this point to the Skagit Board of County Commissioners. While the commissioners approved forwarding the SMP update to the Department of Ecology without addressing climate change or sea level rise, there was a commitment that the county would apply for a readily available DOE grant to amend the SMP to address these topics soon. It comes, then, as a great disappointment that the county planning department pulled the completed application, and the SMP will likely not address sea level rise until a new state law requires it to do so in eight years at the next mandated update. As is so often the case, the county has been opaque about the reasons for this reversal in the face of repeated, detailed, and expert input from the coalition organizations and their memberships. Other counties around Puget Sound have without fuss or resistance voluntarily incorporated sea level rise into their SMPs years ago.

## THE BIG SIT — A BIG SUCCESS! by Colleen Shannon

Skagit Audubon had a very successful Big Sit on Sat., Oct. 7<sup>th</sup> at Rosario Head in Deception Pass State Park. The weather smiled on us, and 26 Skagit Audubon members and friends came out for the birds and our scholarship program. We counted 45 species at Rosario and one home count yielded another 10 species for a total of 55 species. Our donations should be just over \$2,000 for the day which means we will offer two scholarships to Environmental Education students at Skagit Valley Community College. Thank you to all who came out and volunteered and to all those who pledged to support us. A good time was had by all!

## MEET THE EVENING GROSBEAK (Coccothraustes vespertinus) – by Jeff Sinker

Colorful, chunky, and unpredictable when and where they will show up at backyard feeders during the winter,

Evening Grosbeaks spend their summers in coniferous forests of the western US and northern North America. They are so fond of the spruce budworm, a serious forest pest, that the presence of these birds feeding voraciously in a given area can be an early alert that a budworm outbreak is beginning. When they aren't eating budworms, caterpillars, aphids, seeds of many trees and a wide variety of fruits make up the rest of their diet. Their large bills easily crack open big tough seeds, and Pine Siskins or Common Redpolls may travel with Evening Grosbeaks to eat the scraps left behind.

The nest of an Evening Grosbeak is built entirely by the female and located high up in trees such as Norway spruce, white pine,



ponderosa pine, Douglas fir and similar species. She will lay 2-5 eggs and incubate them for 12-14 days. Both parents care for the nestlings (13-14 days) and a successful pair can raise 1-2 broods per season. Breeding pairs are monogamous and will tolerate other birds nearby but do not defend their feeding territories during breeding season.

According to the North American Breeding Bird Survey, populations of Evening Grosbeaks declined by an estimated 74% between 1966-2019 and Partners in Flight includes them on their Yellow Watch List. Because they don't routinely show up in the same places, it is difficult to make large-scale surveys of their numbers. Climate change is likely to negatively affect these birds in some ranges if balsam fir recedes from New England. Aerial spraying by the US and Canada reduces the numbers of forest insects and spruce budworms plus logging and avian-related disease outbreaks also contribute to population declines.

## FROM OLYMPIC NATIONAL PARK – Action Alert – Elwha River

Olympic National Park is seeking public input on an environmental assessment that proposes to construct 12 engineered log jams - structures designed to mimic natural river dynamics - to mitigate impacts from the construction of the U.S. 101 Elwha River Bridge. Earlier this year, the Washington State Department of Transportation began construction to replace the almost 100-year-old bridge.
